Mr. Bohart was an ardent Christian and prayed much for his lost loved ones. Dr. Noble gave the prayers and scripture and Dr Hepburn who had known Charles 24 years gave the personal part. It was a real testimony to his Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. As the many friends passed the flower-banked space and bid farewell to their friend, the organist played " The Lost Chird " which had been his favorite piece of music. While funerals are usually sad friends agreed that this funeral was uplifting. Charles S. Bohart, son of the late Margaret Shambaugh and Ballentine Bohart was born May 11, 1876 at Elvira, Iowa, He is survived by his wife, Mary B. (Callender) Bohart, three brothers, Albert, George and Roy and one sister, Mrs Ethel Henningpen. He had been in business thirty years in Chicago where he won the esteem of hundreds of customers. He was a member of Buena Memorial Presbyterian Church for 24 years, previous to that a member of the Fourth Presbyterian Church of Chicago He had accepted the Lord as his Saviour as a lad in Elvira. On Monday, Dec. 27 the body was taken to Climton, Iowa and placed beside that of his mother.
