INTERESTING DAY - When we visit the cemetery, it opens old wounds. It renews memories of sadness and sorrow. Yesterday, was a day of remembering. It was the day after Decoration and graves were colorful where loving hands had placed beautiful flowers and wreaths about their loved ones.

We went to Montmorenci, three miles from home first. Here is where my parents are buried; with many descendants of Shambaughs, Browns and Switzers. (Immigrant families from the Palatine Valley and Alsace - Lorraine,) and hundreds of friends. Here is where we find Michael and Simon Brown, sons of the immigrant, Michael (Brown) Brown.

Next we went to the Shambaugh Cemetery, and was saddened to see the tremendous neglect. We stumbled through weeds and straightened stones to read names. The sad part here, the soldier boys had been forgotten. No Flags. Grave stones vandalized, and used to take cars out, stuck in mud. The oldest grave, Jacob Shambaugh's wife, Sarah Brown, with his son Jacob, a veteran, near by. Wendell Brown and wife Nancy Shambaugh, died nine days apart. The Browns and Shambaughs had lived on adjoining farms and were cousins. Many children fill this cemetery. The lane leading back to the Shambaugh cemetery had been plowed by the farmer who now owned the Shambaugh land.

Next we drove to Pond Grove Cemetery, near Otterbein, six miles from our home. This cemetery is mostly filled with Browns and their descendants, with a few descendants of Shambaugh with Brown blood. Here we met a family of relatives, and Shambaughs, we hadn't seen for several years. We found Rev. Hadley's grave, husband of Mahala Brown, who was the first United Brethren missionary woman to go to Africa. This cemetery was the best cared for so far.

We drove south about twenty miles to a cemetery called "Mound". An unusual cemetery. The steep upgrade of at least 150 feet, was a perfect globe, with a road around and one through the center, making a circle around. Four roads touched this circle and separated this cemetery into four townships, in Warren County. Beautiful and well kept. The clouds hung heavy all day and threatened rain. As we stood on this high knoll and looked down over the thickly populated grave stones, each with colorful growing peony bushes, the severe winds blew us about, we could barely hold our notes together. We found on name we were interested in. George Brown and wife.

Then we went on to Veedersburg, where pioneer work had been done largely by the Browns. Margaret Brown Hoobler, daughter of Michael and a missionary in the United Brethren Church. A woman strong in faith; her remains sometimes give strength to those who visit her grave. Here again, we find neglect, with not even one flower. Her faithful daughter lies close by.

We intended to visit Rob Roy and Shawnee Mound Cemeteries, but it was far too late, nearly 7:00 P.M. We had chores to do at home. Our baskets were empty of flowers. We had visited in memory with those we love. We had renewed strength to regain our faith, and now the "Day was Over," we were going home.

P. S. - Let me know if you have any particular work for me. Right now I have been going into back history, from library books. Again it is interesting.

Also a history of my grandmother Switzer's family, the Shambaughs. Grandmother Switzer's brother, Dr. Rev. Adam Shambaugh, had written a paper back book, "Family Medical Recipes," at age 85 to finance a United Brethren Church in Wisconsin and a lot of that book is incorporated in "The Grand Prairie".

Fine excerpts of the book were run in the Journal-Courier Friday Magazine of Lafayette, Ind. and have brought in a flood of book orders to me. We put it out here, so I am the Publisher and the price is \$3.75, which includes book, mailer, and postage if anyone is interested in copies. It is a beautiful hard back book with the map of Indiana on the cover, showing Benton, Warren and Tippecanoe Counties in solid gold.

My daughter, Martha Graham, organized my material, typed it, and the DeKalb Office Supply ran it off on multilith. We assembled the pages around my dinette table, and National Library Bindery bound it. It is a professional job and we are proud of it. My "fan mail" is coming from all over the country and is so interesting.
