CLARA REBECCA SHAMBAUGH DICK, daughter of Marvin Chase-Shambaugh and Elizabeth Anne Burgher was born February 26, 1903 at York, Pa. Her education was received in the public and high school of her native city after which she attended Patrick's Business College and did special work at Pennsylvania State College. June 7, 1923 she was married to Rev. R. Harry Dick, a son of Calvin J. and Emily A. Dick. He having been born April 17, 1892 at Evansville, Pa. Mrs Dick is a Republican and a member of the Evangelical denomination. She is active in the work of the P.T.A. Her husband being a member of the Central Pennsylvania Conference and a Mason. The Dicks are at present at Hallowell, Maine. They have two daughters Jean and Dorothy.

CLIFFORD FRANKLIN SHAMBAUGH, son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Shambaugh was born Sept. 20, 1895 at Harlan, Kansas. His early and high school education was received in his home town after which he entered Colorado State College of Education and received his A.M. degree from that institution in 1913. December 23, 1917 he was married to Ora Clare Lyon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Lyon of Salina, Kansas. Those birth date was July 15, 1896. They are the parents of two children, Eva E. Jeanne born Oct. 7, 1918 and Claude Franklin born February 24, 1921. Mr. Shambaugh began his rural teaching in 1918 and became a grade principal in 1919. He served as county superintendent from 1923 to 1929 and has been a superintendent of schools since 1933. He is a member of the Methodist church and a Republican. He has been a member of the Commercial Club and of the Lions Club. He is a member of Phi Delta Kappa and Kappa Delta Pi.

JAMES V SHAMBAUGH, son of Jim V and Mary R D Shambaugh was born February 4, 1899 near Rosedale, Nebraska and went through the public and high school of that city. July 25, 1922 he was married to Lynn H daughter of James and Jessie Branwell who was born July 15, 1902 near Shiloh Rock, Nebraska. Mr. Shambaugh is a Methodist and a Republican. He has been engaged in farming since out of school. They are the parents of Carolyn born August 11, 1923 with Winona born March 18, 1926. James William born Sept. 18, 1929, Doris Evelyn born Dec. 29, 1935 and Dennis Dr. born Sept. 13, 1939.

Sword story

THE FRENCH ANGLE TO DANIEL SHAMBAUGH'S ANCESTRY

1881 census
Charles Daniel Shambaugh, grandson of Daniel Shambaugh, is quoted in 1891 as saying
that his grandfather (Joseph Shambaugh) was a Quaker from New England who
settled in Pennsylvania and was mentioned in the census in 1790. His religious views were Protestant
and he became disaffected with the religious intolerance of the Quakers and he emi-
grated to America. Persons upon whom such influence rested as a child begin a new life

Joseph Shambaugh, another son of Daniel, recollects many traditions. He gives us the following story. " Joseph Shambaugh's grandfather was a German who married a French lady of noble birth. Of course information comes from Raymond Shambaugh who says that this is the traditional story known in southeastern Ohio.

widely known and was a close relative of George Washington. He is the son of the Honorable John Jay, a descendant of Major General John Jay, and a great-great-grandson of Peter Jay, a member of the Jay family.

Opal Rose, passenger of the steamer, the younger child, brought a grandchild, Isaac Newton Shembauer, in 1886, Isaac being a grandson of the Daniel about whom we are writing.

"The sword now in the possession of James B. Shambaugh of DeKalb County, Missouri belonged to Lieutenant Colonel Shambaugh, Chamberlain of the 1st Michigan Artillery who was killed on the 2nd of October 1864 at the Battle of Cedar Creek, Virginia. He was educated in the United States Army under General McClellan and was promoted to Major under General Meade. On September 15, 1864, he took a furlough and went to New York City where he resided at Webster and some of his descendants have afterwards removed to New York and this blade descended to found at the Webster Pennsylvania and Virginia where some of them now live and others of them are scattered over the Western states. At no time of his life did he mention his illegitimate son to his wife or to me. The sword referred to was handed down from his son and came into the possession of our father, Daniel Shambaugh, before DeKalb County, Missouri and upon his death it passed into the possession of my brother James B. Shambaugh where I left it to remain and pass to his descendants upon his death. The family name in parentheses is the way it is spelled in French, 17-1881.

Your editor tried to prove to himself that he had written to the Archives of the Republic in Quebec and received the following from Mr. Antoine Légaré, an officer:

"Mr. de Chambeau was a member of the regiment of Guyenne which Mr. de Chambeau was in 1746, standard bearer, then Lieutenant July 14, 1748. He became sergeant and adjutant about the date of the regiment of Guyenne and regular Quebec, June 1755. At last he was taken after the surrender of Montreal in 1760. According to d'Argenteuil, it is impossible to determine whether Mr. de Chambeau was killed or wounded in the battle on the Plains of Abraham."

From the foregoing it is evident that there seems to be strong traditional evidence of some kind of French ancestry for the Daniel Shembough line. It would be hard to reconcile any of the dates given from the records with the dates mentioned in the battles in Quebec. However, as we have pointed out many times, there is always much difficulty in definitely determining the nativity of those who belong to August 12a or 14 families and often we see no record of their birthplace.

DANIEL SHAMBAUGH OF VIRGINIA

(Most of the information concerning Daniel Shambaugh has been secured by a search of the records at Winchester and Front Royal, Virginia and from information furnished by Mrs Warren S. Fly and from the Pennsylvania Archives.)

The first authentic record we have of Daniel Shambach, the name by which we first know him, is that of his confirmation at the Great Swamp Church, April 10, 1768 on the advent of his fifteenth birthday. Nine years pass before we again find mention of him and this time it was to enlist in Matthew Grier's Company, Hilltown twp., Bucks County where he served as an ensign. Following the Revolutionary War he seems to have settled down just south of Hilltown having married a daughter of Peter Hendriks of Hatfield township. That he was a prosperous farmer and landowner there seems to be no doubt for the tax records show him with large holdings in Worcester and Towamencin townships.

Somewhere about the year 1790 the Shambaughs seem to have been attracted by the general immigration of the people of their section to the lands of the Shenandoah and it is evident that the whole family, except possibly one brother sold their holdings in Pennsylvania and joined the trek to the south. After a time they found land to their liking and on October 1, 1793 Daniel purchased a large tract of land from N. Cartmell in what is now Warren County, Virginia about twelve miles to the south of Winchester close by what is now Reliance. It is apparent from the records that Daniel and his party soon owned much of the land in that immediate neighborhood. A well built colonial type homestead still stands on the original property that we are told was built for Daniel and in which we understand his family and that of his son Jacob's was raised. After a few years those of the brothers who came with Daniel sold their holdings and moved away from Virginia but Daniel had taken root and there he stayed.

In the trek to the south we identify Daniel, a Philip, a Lewis, a Dorothy and a father, George, Frederick County, Virginia included amongst others what is now Hampshire County in West Virginia. The father, George, purchased a large tract of land in that county. We believe he must have lived on it for the final appraisal of his property is made in that county and is dated October 20, 1794. The land is best identified from a Superior Court order filed in Winchester naming Philip Shambaugh and his wife, Peggy; Daniel and wife Catherine; Jacob Snider and wife Dorothy, part of the heirs of George Shambaugh on behalf of all of the heirs.

June 10, 1857, Daniel Shambaugh having reached the age of 84 years and 2 months passed to his reward leaving the settlement of his estate with his son Jacob with whom he probably spent the latter years of his life. His will, made a few months previous lists his five sons, Jacob on the homestead, Joseph who had gone to Ohio, Daniel who had gone to Missouri, John and Benjamin, deceased. He names five daughters as well, Mary and Margaret, spinsters, known to the family as Polly and Peggy; Rachel who married Jacob House and who later went to Nebraska; Ann, twice married, once to Hamcock and second to Grampston; and Abigail, wife of Jacob Hauck.

Jacob, the eldest son died in 1855 and his entire family packed up and moved to Iowa leaving in Virginia only a few of the descendants of John, Benjamin, Ann and Abigail. At the present time we have record of no one by the name of Shambaugh in that section.

On the next page we have drawn a map of Pennsylvania, locating the early property of Daniel and by which we may trace those Shambaughs who stayed in Pennsylvania.
