In the first place we didn't turn where we should have! Deniel was at home, but he really knew very little of his ancestors beyond his gaandfather. While we were there the brother William came in and we all visited together, but as to getting any deffinite information from either of them to tie them into other known groups we were doomed to disappointment. I believe they are decended from one of the orphaned grandchildren of Daniel of Virginia, but at present there is nothing to prove or disprove this. There was a graciousness about William one would hardly expect to find for the family had lived bottled up in the mountains for possibly three or more generations. William reminded me somewhat of my own father, the larger and more robust. He seemed very kind and really would liked to have helped us in our research to discover where their line fitted into the lines we already have established.
