MRS M C MURPHY DIES IN OKLAHOMA..... Mrs Teresa Boyd of Coshocton, Ohio reports the death of her sister, a native of Coshocton County as of December 23, 1942 at the home of her daughter, Mrs J A Shellnut of Chickasha, Oklahoma, the result of an illness with complications. Mary Caroline Shambaugh was born Nov. 6, 1857, the daughter of Charles T and Caroline Shambaugh. Shortly after her marriage to W W Parks she and her husband went to Kansas where they lived until Oklahoma was opened up. Here they lived in this newest of pioneer states, developing a fine home made happier with a son and four daughters. Upon the death of Mr. Parks our subject remained a widow for some time and then married Albert Murphy, a storekeeper at Naples, Okla. Mr Murphy also preceeded her in death and for several years she has made her home with Mrs Shellnut, her oldest daughter at Chickasha. Her second daughter, Teresa, married W F Taylor of Carnegie, Oklahoma, while the third, Elva, married George Hawke of Henney, Oklahoma. The youngest daughter married J C Anthes and resides in California.
