Then back to Boulder, Wyoming we visited relatives, and then headed toward St. Paul, Minn. as we approached Aberdeen, S. D. Ina outran a couple of tornadoes and hail storm, by changing our course, we got only a few sprinkles. After the night in Aberdeen, a day in Malden Rock, Wisc., another night at Mason, Iowa, we got to our home town of Arlington about noon on Sat. My sister in law, Mrs Cora Gleim, had previously flown in from N. J., so we visited there and attended church, then Sunday afternoon we headed for Boone, Iowa, arriving around supper time and found the family waiting for us. I spent that week doing absolutely nothing but resting. arriving home Friday afternoon July 8, at 5 o'clock, rolling up 3600 miles.
