Checking back over records and trying to recover thoughts you may have had while writing memoranda is not an easy matter unless that particular interest is your supreme interest. Since my entry into the ministry in 1946 you can readily understand that this is not my case and as I review the accounts of over two decades ago I have to take time out to refresh my memory.

Thus far I have told you of Lois Castleberry and Cleo Gervin and my first contact with each of them. We now come to the time when the three of us were to meet together for the first time. This meeting took place at the Loudenville Reunion in 1941 after each of us had been working on Shambaugh history for more than ten years. This our second Reunion and from any standpoint it will be remembered as a grand success. Looking back over the record of that day my heart is saddened as I think of those who have gone on to the Great Reunion over there.

Very early in our search for the original Shambaugh's in America, a disagreement arose in our ranks which same out in the open as the three of us met for the first time in the Loudenville Hotel.

There are on records the account of two arrivals of Shambaughs or Shambachs in America. August 19. 1729 the ship Mortonhouse arrives in Philadelphia from the Palatinate vis Notterdam. On this ship were four people named Shambach- Adam, Christoff, Anna crothy and Elizabeth, probably husbands and wives. Sept. 9. 1749 the ship St. Andrew arrived in America from Hamburg listing as one of its passengers a George Shambach. The three investigators found two lines of Shambaughs, both of them headed by a George Shambaugh or Shambach. It was the opinion of some of us that these two were related, but probably no nearer than cousins. Others of us believed that the entire line of Shambaughs really orginated from the George Shambaugh who came in 1749. We find no George Shambaugh listed in the 1720 group, but minors were seldom listed on the ships lists. In previncial papers of the county of Philadelphia under the date of Feb. 13, 1739 we find a George Shambock listed owning 100 acres of land. April 29, 1740 in Bucks Co. we find a George Shambaugh listed with 150 acres of land and Feb. 28, 1743 the Same with 40 acres os land. Now these Land warrants of Quit rental were issued by heirs of wm. Penn and only to those of legal age, therefore it would seem that this George would have had to have been born previous to 1718 which would have made him ten or eleven years of age if he was one of the minor passengers on the Mortonhouse. on the Mortonhouse.

Well, Lois has passed on, but Cleo and the writer are still here, and each holds tenaciously to their own view point. After more than thirty years of research we will need new facts to break the deadlock.

As well as the bran and middlings, which most people want for their coffee cakes, pan cakes etc. Our sorthum we get from our friends who raise it organically, and use the old threshing engine to make steem for the cooking of the syrup, and with a thermostatic control method.

Our cheese and butter are from other friends, which takes us back to the good lays of yesteryear. As well as the raw sugars, the honey and the brown rice.

I am a great geneology fan, I have two rooms up stairs with shelves made out of glazed bricks and boxes or pictures, writings, old bibles, clippings and what have you stacked clear to the ceiling, from great aunts and uncles, and how mothers and fathers. Old furniture. My house isn't so very modern, but my furnishings tell me stories of an intersting life gone on.

Our daughter Dorothea and husband Donnell taught at Ames State College for ten years before moving to Urbana. Ill. a couple years ago. On our trips to visit them at Ames, we would stop at the Amama Colonies on our way. Anyone interested in old history, antiques and such, shouldn't miss meeting these marvelous people. The eight colonies are all active and are furnishing world trade as much as ever.
